## ***Flood Fest Deemed a Rousing Success***

The 2013 Flood Fest event held on September 14, 2013 was a wonderful success. Visitors were also treated to a preview of new interpretive panels that will be installed this winter inside the Dry Falls Interpretive Center. It is estimated there were about 550 people who took in the Flood Fest including 450 people who entered the visitor center and another 100 or so people who took in the information booths and concession stand outside.

Guest speakers drew large crowds to listen to Dr. Karl Lillquist, who spoke on the modern uses of the Grand Coulee and Channeled Scablands and Dr. Nick Zentner, who talked about the formation of the Grand Coulee. There were four informational booths represented by the Ice Age Floods Institute, Coulee Corridor Consortium, Bureau of Reclamation, and Big Horn Marketing, all of whom stated they had prolific numbers of visitors and gave away a vast array of educational literature. ### ***CCC supports 21<sup>st</sup> Century Grant Efforts***

The CCC is partnering with Ephrata and Soap Lake schools through the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Grant mechanism, along with other organizations along the byway, to support establishment of a learning center to provide educational opportunities for students when schools are not in session. The CCC will be directly involved in educational events as part of a 5 year planned effort. The grant that supports this was one of only 10 proposals approved for funding at the desired level in 2013.

### ***Coulee Corridor Quilt Trail Takes Root***

Marlene Oddie, Kissed Quilts, [www.kissedquilts.com](http://www.kissedquilts.com), in Grand Coulee has offered to continue promoting establishment of a quilt trail along the Coulee Corridor on businesses and barns throughout the byway. Visitors to our area will be encouraged to check out progress as quilt blocks are installed throughout the area. Hopefully, quilting efforts like these may help bring additional tourists and provide another recreational activity to the Coulee Corridor.

Kittitas County, Washington has the first barn quilt trail in the state. It offers a free leaflet which promotes a öyear round, self guided driving tour of 39 block quilts that honors our agricultural heritage and industryö and celebrates the American quilt and the strong women who made them. Grant County established the first quilt block on a barn in Coulee City in 2013 but there are opportunities for many more.

## ***COULEE PIONEER MUSEUM***

The Coulee Pioneer Museum just became a reality for some of the original area pioneers. The public is invited to view the fantastic array of accumulated materials of the Grand Coulee Dam Area. The past several months have been busy as volunteers rounded up pictures, stories, and compiled historical information which was displayed in several locations throughout the area while the Museum Board sought a permanent facility. Christmas came early to the coulee as a local businessman recently donated a building to the museum's cause and materials have now been moved to their new home at 3 Coulee Blvd., Electric City.

The Coulee Pioneer Museum Board was formed in 2007. Goals are to provide ways of preserving the history of the Grand Coulee Dam and offer avenues for the community to display the varied heritage of the Grand Coulee Dam Area at a local facility. Anyone interested in promoting and preserving the history of the Grand Coulee Dam Area is eligible for membership.



A 1935 Grand Coulee Dam Site Directory was recently acquired depicting all the towns and features in the vicinity. Some of them include Basin City, Coulee Dam, the West Dam Site, Coulee Dam City; Osborne, Elmerton and much much more. For instance, it is interesting to note that in 1935 there were golf courses between Elmer City and Nespelem and one could golf for \$.25 for nine holes. Osborne, which now lies under the waters of Banks Lake, was called "The Family Man's Town". Carmichael Hospital and a business called "Hole in Wall" Real Estate and Rental were located in Grand Coulee. The above mentioned directory has almost as many entries in it as the current area phone book.

Acquisitions continue to be accepted and it is expected the museum will grow and continue to document the history of the area. The Museum is working closely with the Grand Coulee Dam Area Lions Club who owns and operates the Spring Canyon Cemetery with a goal of updating the 1700 residents at Spring Canyon.
